A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Throughout 2025, SHOW continued expanding and strengthening our Supportive Housing Program for older adults at 144 Erb Street East, the first program of its kind in Waterloo Region. What began as an innovative response to an emerging crisis has become a vital community resource, helping individuals transition from the experience of homelessness into stable housing with access to ongoing support, community, and dignity.

This year also marked important progress toward the future of supportive housing in our community. SHOW moved forward with plans for a 10-unit modular supportive housing development at our 362 Erb Street West property, a project that will create additional deeply affordable supportive housing units for older adults. At the same time, planning advanced on the proposed expansion of 144 Erb Street East, which aims to add 38 new supportive housing units and enhanced community spaces designed to help older adults age safely and successfully within supportive housing.

While these projects represent growth and hope for the future, our focus remains grounded in the everyday work happening inside our buildings. Across our supportive housing programs, residents received housing stability, wellness supports, food security initiatives, life skills

programming, crisis intervention, and compassionate care from a dedicated team committed to meeting people where they are.

This work would not be possible without the extraordinary support of our community. In 2025, donors, volunteers, faith communities, businesses, schools, foundations, and community partners continued to stand beside SHOW in meaningful ways. From another record-breaking Coldest Night of the Year campaign to community-led fundraising efforts, we were reminded time and again that Waterloo Region cares deeply about building a more compassionate and inclusive community.

SHOW'ing UP IN THE COMMUNITY

NO PLACE TO GROW OLD: RAISING AWARENESS THROUGH FILM AND CONVERSATION

SHOW was proud to host the Canadian premiere screening of *No Place to Grow Old* at the historic Princess Twin Cinemas in Waterloo—an evening dedicated to raising awareness about the growing housing crisis facing older adults in our community. Presented in partnership with Humans for Housing, the documentary explored the realities of aging without stable housing and challenged attendees to think critically about the urgent need for affordable, supportive housing solutions for seniors. The event brought together donors, community members, advocates, local leaders, and housing supporters for an evening of education, reflection, and meaningful conversation.

The screening featured remarks from Waterloo Mayor Dorothy McCabe, who spoke about the local impact of the housing crisis on older adults, as well as a virtual discussion with filmmaker Davey Schaupp and SHOW Executive Director Brian Paul. Attendees also heard directly from a SHOW resident, offering a powerful firsthand perspective on the importance of supportive housing and the stability it provides. Throughout the evening, guests engaged deeply with the issues presented in the film and reflected on how community-driven solutions can create lasting change.

More than just a film screening, *No Place to Grow Old* became an opportunity to strengthen community connections and amplify advocacy efforts surrounding homelessness and aging. The event highlighted SHOW's commitment not only to providing housing and wraparound supports, but also to fostering important conversations that inspire action. Thanks to the generosity and engagement of our supporters, the evening reinforced a shared belief that everyone deserves the dignity of a safe, stable place to call home—at every stage of life.

SUPPORTING STUDENTS, STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY

For the past two summers, the Ayres Family Summer Student Scholarship has created meaningful opportunities for students to gain hands-on experience in supportive housing while making a lasting impact on the residents of SHOW. Through the generosity of the Ayres Family, students have been able to work directly alongside staff, support resident programming, build relationships within the community, and develop valuable skills that will shape their future careers in social services and community care. Their presence has brought fresh energy, compassion, and additional support to SHOW during the busy summer months.

Beyond supporting student learning, the scholarship has strengthened SHOW's ability to provide meaningful engagement opportunities and day-to-day support for residents. By investing in students, the Ayres Family is also investing in the future of compassionate community leadership and supportive housing. We are incredibly grateful for their continued partnership and excited that they have once again committed to sponsoring a student for the upcoming summer, continuing the ripple effect of care, learning, and community impact for a third consecutive year.



SHOW'ing UP IN THE COMMUNITY

STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY THROUGH RESEARCH

Exploring Community Perspectives on Supportive Housing with Laurier University



In 2025, SHOW partnered with Wilfrid Laurier University on two research initiatives focused on supportive housing and SHOW's broader impact within the Waterloo Region community. Through surveys, interviews, academic research, and community engagement, the projects explored both the benefits of supportive housing and how SHOW is perceived as a neighbour, community partner, and housing provider.

The research found strong overall perceptions of SHOW and recognized the organization as a respectful and positive presence within the neighbourhood. Findings reinforced that supportive housing does not increase crime or negatively impact surrounding communities and instead contributes to greater stability, inclusion, and overall community well-being. The research also highlighted how stigma and misconceptions can influence resistance to supportive housing developments, while identifying opportunities for SHOW to continue strengthening communication, education, and neighbourhood engagement. Recommendations included expanding community connection through initiatives such as open houses, storytelling, and proactive outreach efforts. You can read the full report on SHOW's website.

Learning Through Lived Experience: Insights from Conestoga Research



2025 also saw SHOW partner with two student research groups from Conestoga College's Bachelor of Community and Criminal Justice program to explore supportive housing from both resident and staff perspectives. Together, the projects examined resident outcomes related to independence, self-efficacy, and social connectedness, while also exploring how staff define and experience success within supportive housing environments. Findings highlighted the importance of stable housing, trust-based relationships, integrated supports, and community connection in creating positive outcomes. The research reinforced that supportive housing is about more than housing alone—it supports well-being, reduces isolation, builds confidence, and creates opportunities for long-term stability through individualized, relationship-based care.

GIVING TUESDAY 2025: A COMMUNITY OF HOPE AND GENEROSITY

SHOW's 2025 GivingTuesday campaign, "Home for the Holidays: Giving Hope, Building Futures," was a powerful reminder of what can happen when a community comes together with compassion and purpose.

Thanks to the incredible generosity of our donors — and a transformative \$10,000 matching gift from an anonymous donor — SHOW raised just over \$23,000 in support of our supportive housing programs and resident services. Every donation, large or small, helped provide residents with essential resources, life skills programming, crisis support, and the stability they need to thrive.

The campaign's theme, "Bring Hope Home," resonated deeply throughout the community. Through social media, email outreach, and peer-to-peer advocacy from supporters, Board members, and staff, the campaign not only raised critical funds but also increased awareness about the importance of supportive housing and the growing need in Waterloo Region.

Most importantly, GivingTuesday 2025 reminded our residents that they are not alone. Because of the kindness and generosity of our community, residents experienced the warmth, dignity, and belonging that everyone deserves during the holidays. To everyone who donated, shared our message, and championed SHOW's work — thank you for helping bring hope home.



STRENGTHENING THE TEAM THAT STRENGTHENS COMMUNITY

In 2025, SHOW received a \$15,000 grant through the Plan to End Chronic Homelessness (PECH) to support the “Reset and Renew: Frontline Wellness Days” initiative — a staff wellness program focused on supporting the mental health, connection, and long-term sustainability of SHOW’s frontline workforce. Designed specifically for staff working within SHOW’s 24/7 supportive housing environments, the initiative recognized the importance of caring for those who provide daily support to residents experiencing homelessness, trauma, and complex life challenges.

Over the course of the funding period, SHOW delivered more than a dozen wellness-focused activities and team-building opportunities, including retreats, creative workshops, journaling and self-care sessions, candle-making, pottery painting, meditation experiences, and team dinners.

The initiative resulted in meaningful improvements in staff wellness and workplace culture. Staff reported reduced feelings of stress and burnout, alongside stronger peer relationships, and increased team connection across programs. The initiative also helped normalize conversations around mental health and wellness, encouraging staff to integrate self-care and reflection into

their daily routines. Collectively, these outcomes point toward early but promising signs of lasting cultural change that prioritizes staff well-being, connection, and long-term sustainability.

The final report highlighted that smaller, more frequent wellness opportunities proved especially effective in supporting staff accessibility and participation. The initiative also reinforced the importance of embedding wellness into workplace culture on an ongoing basis rather than relying solely on one-time events.

The Reset and Renew initiative strengthened SHOW’s commitment to workforce wellness while helping foster a healthier, more connected, and more sustainable workplace culture for the staff who support residents every day.



MOVING FOR GOOD: HONORING A LEGACY OF COMPASSION



In September 2025, more than 60 community members came together for Moving for Good: The Walk to End Chronic Homelessness. Hosted by the Lynn Macaulay Legacy Project (LMLP) in support of SHOW, the event was a powerful demonstration of what can be achieved when a community unites around a shared vision of housing, dignity, and hope.

Thanks to the generosity of participants, sponsors, and donors, the event raised more than \$13,000 to support SHOW residents through life skills programming, wrap-around supports, and future housing initiatives. These funds will help ensure residents continue to have access to the resources, relationships, and opportunities they need to build stable and meaningful lives.

Beyond fundraising, the walk served as an opportunity to raise awareness about homelessness in our community and to honor the legacy of Lynn Macaulay, whose compassion and commitment to housing justice continue to inspire this important work.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the Lynn Macaulay Legacy Project and every walker, donor, volunteer, and supporter who made this event possible. Together, you are helping create more than housing—you are helping build community, belonging, and brighter futures for those who call SHOW home.

EXPANDING SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR OLDER ADULTS

Older adults are now the fastest-growing group entering the shelter system, with many experiencing homelessness for the very first time. At SHOW, we have witnessed this growing need firsthand. Since 2021, the number of older adults aged 65+ added to our waitlist has increased by 400%, highlighting the urgent need for safe, affordable, and supportive housing options within our community.

In response, SHOW is moving forward with a new 10-unit modular supportive housing build behind our existing site at 362 Erb Street West in Waterloo. Designed specifically for older adults experiencing or at risk of homelessness, this project represents both urgency and hope. With support from the Region of Waterloo, including a \$1.1 million investment, modular construction allows us to create housing more quickly and efficiently while minimizing disruption to the surrounding community.

More than simply providing housing, this project will offer residents access to personalized, on-site support that promote stability, independence, dignity, and connection. It reflects what is possible when a community comes together to ensure older adults are not left behind.

FINDING INDEPENDENCE, SAFETY, AND COMMUNITY — PATRICIA'S JOURNEY

When Patricia reflects on the past few years, she describes a period marked by uncertainty, loss, and instability. After losing her job, she found herself without a support system to rely on. What followed was something she never imagined would happen to her: the experience of homelessness.

For a time, Patricia lived in her car before staying with family members. Eventually, those arrangements came to an end, leaving her with nowhere to go. She entered the shelter system with her two beloved dogs and began navigating a future she never expected to face. "I wasn't mentally ready for it," Patricia recalls. "You're dealing with being homeless, looking for work, losing things, and trying to figure out what comes next."

The experience became even more difficult when her long-term relationship came to an end during this period of instability. Yet despite the challenges, Patricia continued moving forward, drawing on her resilience and determination to rebuild her life.

After spending time in a shelter and working with various community organizations, Patricia was connected to SHOW. It was a turning point. The transition into supportive housing provided more than a roof over her head. It gave her something she had not experienced in a long time: stability.

Today, Patricia lives independently in her own apartment and speaks passionately about what that independence means to her.

"I've never lived by myself my whole life," she says. "I'm 60 years old, and I love it."

For Patricia, supportive housing offers a balance that is difficult to find elsewhere. She values having her own space and privacy while knowing support is available whenever she needs it. "It's safety and independence," she explains. "You can be vulnerable and still feel safe." Patricia credits SHOW staff with creating an environment where residents are treated as individuals rather than numbers. She appreciates that staff take the time to understand each person's unique needs and circumstances.

"They recognize us as individuals," she says. "I've never been in a place where I knew everybody in the building. There's a real sense of community here."

MORE THAN HOUSING:

At SHOW, we often speak about the importance of "wrap-around supports" — but what does that mean? Simply put, wrap-around support is the individualized services, relationships, and day-to-day assistance that help residents not only remain housed but truly thrive.

Many individuals who come to SHOW have experienced chronic homelessness, trauma, isolation, mental health challenges, or barriers that make maintaining housing difficult without ongoing support. Providing someone with a key to an apartment is only one part of the solution. Lasting housing stability happens when people also have access to

compassionate staff, practical support, and a community that helps them feel safe, connected, and valued.

At SHOW, wrap-around supports can include life skills programming, food security initiatives, transportation assistance, medication support, social and recreational activities, referrals to healthcare providers, and one-on-one case management. Sometimes, support means helping a resident attend a medical appointment or reconnect with community services. Other times, it is as simple — and as meaningful — as sharing a meal, checking in after a difficult day, or celebrating milestones together.

FINDING CONNECTION, SECURITY, AND A PLACE TO BELONG — TEX'S JOURNEY

When Tex reflects on the period before coming to SHOW, he remembers uncertainty, instability, and the constant challenge of simply finding a safe place to stay. After conflicts arose in his previous living situation, he found himself living in a park before health complications led to a hospital stay. From there, he was connected to emergency shelter services and spent more than a year navigating homelessness and temporary housing.

"I didn't even know SHOW existed until I got here," Tex recalls. "They just told me they had an apartment for me." When Tex arrived, he came with little more than his clothing. Thanks to community partners, his apartment was equipped with the essential furnishings and household items needed to help him settle in. "I was really touched by that," he says. "They did a really good job making sure I had what I needed."

Today, Tex says the biggest difference in his life is the sense of security and support he experiences every day. Living with ongoing health concerns, he values knowing that staff are nearby when he needs assistance.

"It's nice to have staff here in case there's a problem," he explains. "If something happens, I know somebody is going to check on me."

Aside from housing, SHOW has helped Tex build meaningful relationships and reconnect with the community. Through resident outings, social activities, and support programs, he has visited places he would likely never have explored on his own and has developed friendships both inside and outside the building.

Most importantly, Tex says his time at SHOW has helped him grow as a person. He speaks openly about challenging long-held assumptions and learning to see people differently. "I've learned to take a second look before I judge," he says. "Just because someone is different doesn't mean they're wrong. They have the same feelings as everybody else."

With support from staff, counselling services, and fellow residents, Tex continues to work through life's challenges while building a stronger future. He especially appreciates the sense of community that surrounds him.

For Tex, SHOW represents more than housing. It provides stability, connection, and peace of mind. "I would recommend it to anybody," he says. "The people who support this place deserve a lot of credit. Without them, none of this would be here."

His story is a reminder that supportive housing is about more than providing a roof overhead—it creates opportunities for healing, growth, and belonging.



WHAT "WRAP-AROUND SUPPORTS" REALLY MEANS

This support is critical because housing stability is deeply connected to overall well-being. When residents feel supported, they are better able to improve their physical and mental health, build relationships, maintain independence, and create a sense of home and belonging.

This work is only possible because of the generosity of our community. Every donation helps ensure residents have access not only to housing, but to the care, connection, and support that allows them to move forward with dignity and hope.



SHOW's 2026 COLDEST NIGHT OF THE YEAR

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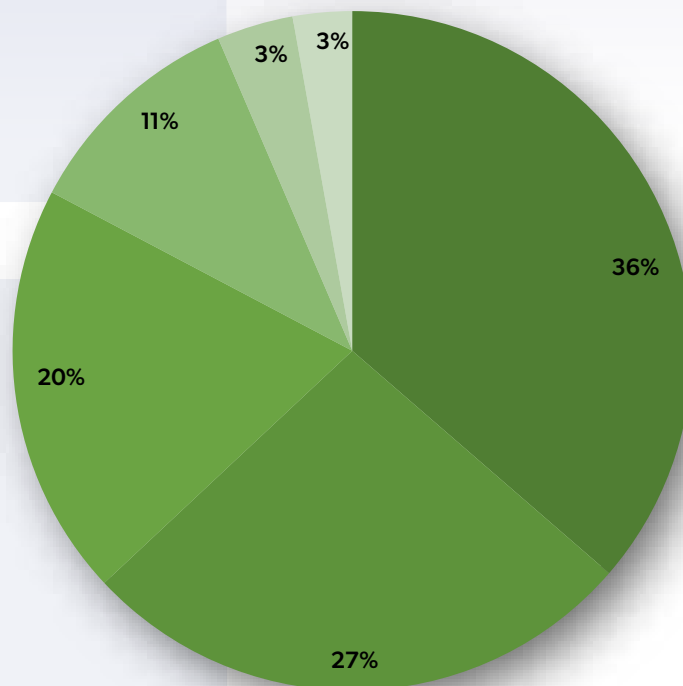

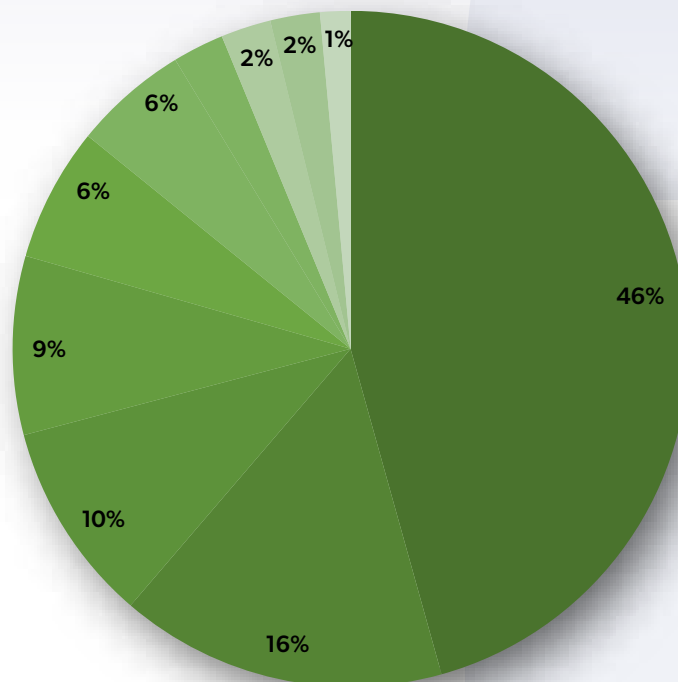
